## **PROGRAM**

This piece is about the wonder and awe felt when standing at the base of a waterfall. The piece is separated into three parts. The first is an endless stream of eighth notes moving through many different tonal centers based around a pedal E-flat in the right hand. The second section is an aleatoric section supposed to evoke the feeling of the mist created from the crashing water. The last section increases the rhythmic intensity as it rises into the upper register of the piano which climaxes by returning to the first chord of the piece.

Stormlight is the composer's first orchestral piece of music, which is based on his favorite book series *The Stormlight Archive* by Brandon Sanderson. The first movement, "Shallan", was performed for the University Symphony Orchestra in March. "Kaladin" is a saxophone quintet arrangement of the second movement. Throughout this piece you will hear the mental turmoil and triumphs that the character Kaladin goes through in the melodies and countermelodies played by the soprano and tenor saxophone. There are moments of disjointedness, a sense of drowning loneliness and a newfound peace.
