About the Host and Clinician

Passionate about performing music from diverse cultural traditions, Asieh Mahvar serves as the Interim Director of Orchestral Studies at Pacific Lutheran University and the Symphony Orchestra Conductor at the West Seattle Community Orchestra. A Doctor of Musical Arts candidate in Orchestral Conducting at Michigan State University, Ms. Mahyar holds an MM in orchestral conducting from the University of Massachusetts Amherst and a BM in choral conducting from the Komitas State Conservatory in Yerevan, Armenia. Originally from Iran, Ms. Mahyar is one of the few female conductors from her country, bringing a wealth of diverse conducting experience to her roles. Her past positions include Assistant Conductor at Michigan State University, the University of Massachusetts Amherst, and Tchaikovsky Music College in Armenia. She has collaborated with professional orchestras such as the Grand Rapids Symphony and Jackson Symphony, Michigan, and the Mansfield Symphony Orchestra, Ohio. Her commitment to music education is evident through her work as a clinician and adjudicator with various Washington State high school orchestras, festivals, and conferences, including the WMEA Conference 2024-Junior All-State Orchestra, Lake Stevens High School Solo Ensemble Competition (MPMEA), PLU Invitational High School Orchestra and Band Festivals, Mercer Island High School Festival, and Capital High School Orchestra Festival. Ms. Mahyar's extensive experience encompasses leading instrumental and vocal ensembles and directing full opera productions. Ms. Mahyar has been selected for prestigious conducting workshops and conferences, working alongside leading conductors such as Christian Macelaru and Octavio Más-Arocas at the Cabrillo Music Festival, Richard Rosenberg at the National Music Festival, Gerard Schwarz at the Eastern Music Festival, Miguel Harth-Bedoya at the Conducting Institute, and Kenneth Kiesler at the Conductors Retreat at Medomak.

About the Guest Conductor

Ron Gerhardstein is the Director of Bands and Associate Professor of Music at PLU. Dr. Gerhardstein has enjoyed a long career as a music educator in public school and collegiate settings. At PLU, he directs the Wind Ensemble and he teaches coursework in the music education curriculum, including: Band Repertoire and Rehearsal, Woodwind Labs I/II, Percussion Lab, Music and Culture, and PLUS 100: Transitions to PLU. Dr. Gerhardstein earned a Ph.D. in music education from Temple University where he studied with Edwin Gordon and Beth Bolton. He also attended the University of Idaho, earning a Bachelor's degree in music education, and a Masters of Music (saxophone performance) studying with Robert Miller. Dr. Gerhardstein is a frequent workshop clinician, guest conductor, and festival adjudicator. Prior to coming to PLU in 2014, he was the band director at West Valley High School in Yakima where his band program had a reputation for excellence in all areas (concert band, jazz band, and marching band). He has proudly served as an honor band conductor on several occasions, most notably the 2019 APAC Honor Band in Kobe, Japan, and the 2017 WMEA Junior All-State "Rainier" Band. A passionate advocate for music education, Ron is an active member of WMEA, currently serving a two-year term as WMEA President. Dr. Gerhardstein makes his home in Tacoma with his wife, Jerilyn, an elementary teacher librarian in the Bethel School District.

About the Guest Clinicians

Korine Fujiwara is professor of violin, viola, and composition at PLU. She served for many years on the music faculty of Ohio Wesleyan University and is in great demand for masterclasses and clinics throughout the United States. She is a founding member of the Carpe Diem String Quartet, a devoted and sought-after chamber musician and teacher, and a gifted composer and arranger. Named as one of *Strings Magazine*'s "25 Contemporary Composers to Watch," Korine has received multiple commissions including works for opera, chamber ensembles, chorus, concerti, and music for modern dance. Her works have been performed throughout the United States, Canada, Great Britain, Italy, The Netherlands, Switzerland, Spain, Australia, China, and Japan. Critics have remarked of Ms. Fujiwara's music, "The ear is forever tickled by beautifully judged music that manages to be sophisticated and accessible at the same time" (*Fanfare Magazine*); "She knows how to exploit all the resources of string instruments alone and together" (*Strings Magazine*). "Fujiwara beautifully meets the challenge of weaving together different emotions across generations that make sense musically while delighting the ear" (*WOSU Classical 101 by Request*). "Fujiwara's music is rich and beguiling throughout;" (*The Columbus Dispatch*) "Artfully layered and knitted together" (*The Wall Street Journal*). Korine is a recipient of an Opera America Commissioning Grant from the Opera Grants for Female Composers program, made possible through the generosity of The Virginia B. Toulmin Foundation, for her award-winning composition *The Flood*, with Stephen Wadsworth, librettist, premiered in full production by Opera Columbus and ProMusica Chamber Orchestra

in February 2019. Ms. Fujiwara holds degrees from The Juilliard School and Northwestern University and began her orchestral career with the Brooklyn Philharmonic and the ProMusica Chamber Orchestra of Columbus. She was also a member of the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, where she held the position of Acting Assistant Principal Second Violin. Korine performs on a 1790 Contreras violin, 2004 Kurt Widenhouse viola, and bows by three of today's finest makers, Paul Martin Siefried, Ole Kanestrom, and Charles Espey, all of Port Townsend, WA, USA. Outside of her musical endeavors, she enjoys chocolate, ramen, and geocaching.

Anna Jensen is the Executive Director of the Tacoma Youth Symphony Association where she conducts the Tacoma String Philharmonic. During the academic year, she teaches at PLU as the Lecturer of Double Bass and at the University of Puget Sound as the Director of Orchestras and Instructor of Double Bass. She is also the Director of Orchestras at the Annie Wright Schools. During the summer, Dr. Jensen teaches at The Evergreen Music Festival and The Hammond Ashley Bass Workshop. In recognition of her dedication to music education, Dr. Jensen was awarded the Outstanding Master Studio Teacher Award from the American String Teachers Association, WA Chapter and the WMEA "Friend of Music" award. As a conductor, Dr. Jensen is a frequent clinician, adjudicator, and guest conductor for All-State orchestras, district festivals, contests, and workshops across the Pacific Northwest, including Washington, Oregon, and Alaska. Dr. Jensen is the assistant principal bassist of Symphony Tacoma, the principal bassist of the Tacoma Opera Orchestra, the principal bassist of the Tacoma City Ballet Orchestra, and performs with the Paramount Theater Orchestra.
