Singin' in the Rain

Nacio Herb Brown (music) was one of the most popular 1920s and 1930s film composers, known for his work in *Temptation, A New Moon Is Over My Shoulder*, and *Broadway Melody*. His greatest success, however, was *Singin' in the Rain* with his partner Arthur Freed.

Arthur Freed (lyrics) was a composer and famous Hollywood producer of nearly 50 films. Some of his famous pieces include "Make 'em Laugh," "All I Do Is Dream of You," and "Alone."

All the Things You Are

Jerome Kern (music) is considered one of the most important composers of musical theatre and popular music of the early twentieth century, having written more than 700 songs, including "Ol' Man River," "A Fine Romance," and "The Way You Look Tonight" among others.

Oscar Hammerstein II (lyrics) won eight Tony Awards and two Academy Awards for his music. He is best known for his collaborations with Richard Rodgers; as a duo, they wrote *Oklahoma!*, *Carousel*, *South Pacific*, *The King and I*, and *The Sound of Music*.

Something to Live For

Duke Ellington (music and lyrics) was an American jazz pianist, composer, and leader of his jazz orchestra from 1923 through the rest of his life. At the end of the 1930s, Ellington began a nearly thirty-year collaboration with composer-arranger-pianist Billy Strayhorn, whom he called his writing and arranging companion. He was awarded a posthumous Pulitzer Prize Special Award for music in 1999.

Billy Strayhorn (music and lyrics) was an American jazz composer, pianist, lyricist, and arranger who collaborated with bandleader and composer Duke Ellington for nearly three decades. His compositions include "Take the 'A' Train", "Chelsea Bridge", "A Flower Is a Lovesome Thing", and "Lush Life".

Fly Me to the Moon

Bart Howard (music and lyrics) was an American composer and songwriter, most notably of the jazz standard "Fly Me to the Moon", which has been performed by Kaye Ballard, Judy Garland, Frank Sinatra, Tony Bennett, Ella Fitzgerald, Nancy Wilson, Della Reese, Diana Krall, Paul Anka, Brenda Lee, Nat King Cole, Peggy Lee, Sia and Lady Gaga among others.

Shopping Around

Harold Rome (music and lyrics) was an American composer, lyricist, and writer for musical theatre whose work includes *Fanny*, *Destry Rides Again*, and *I Can Get It for You Wholesale*, in which Barbra Streisand made her Broadway debut. In 1991, Rome was presented with a special Drama Desk Award for his "distinctive contribution to musical theater". Later that same year, he was inducted into the American Theater Hall of Fame.

Tutti Frutti

Richard Wayne Penniman (Little Richard) (music and lyrics), known more for his career as a singer, was a defining figure in popular music for decades. Some of his hit songs include "Long Tall Sally," "Rip It Up," and "Good Golly, Miss Molly."

Dorothy LaBostrie (lyrics), best known for co-writing "Tutti Frutti," rewrote the song due to the original being deemed too provocative in 1955 and transformed it into a defining Rock and Roll song. Her other works include "Rich Woman," "I Won't Cry," and "You Can Have My Husband But Please Don't Mess With My Man."

Twistin' the Night Away

Sam Cooke (music and lyrics), one of the most influential Soul artists, found acclaim for his R&B, Gospel, and of course, Soul music. Some of his hits include "Another Saturday Night," "Cupid," and "A Change Is Gonna Come."

Them There Eyes

Maceo Pinkard (music), a music publisher and composer, had various hits and popularity during the 1920s. Some of his songs include "Sugar," "Gimmie a Little Kiss, Will Ya Huh?" and "At Twilight."

Doris Tauber (music), a composer, along with vocalist, pianist, and arranger, was famous for her work in both "Them There Eyes" and "Drinking Again."

William Tracey (lyrics) started his career as a staffer for publishing companies, and eventually through his work with composers became a lyricist. Some of his popular works include "I'm Walkin' On Air," "At Twilight," and "It's Too Late Now."

Lucky to Be Me

Leonard Bernstein (music) was an American conductor, composer, pianist, music educator, and author. Considered to be one of the most important conductors of his time, he was the first American-born conductor to receive international acclaim. His work includes *West Side Story*, *On the Town* and *Candide*.

Betty Comden (lyrics) was an American lyricist, playwright, and screenwriter who contributed to numerous Hollywood musicals and Broadway shows of the mid-20th century. Her writing partnership with Adolph Green spanned six decades: the longest running creative partnership in theatre history.

Adolph Green (lyrics) was an American lyricist and playwright who, with long-time collaborator Betty Comden, penned the screenplays and songs for musicals on Broadway and in Hollywood including *Peter Pan*, *The Will Rogers Follies*, and *Bells are Ringing*.

Unforgettable

Irving Gordon (music and lyrics) was a renowned composer who won a Grammy Award when Natalie Cole re-recorded her father Nat King Cole's rendition of "Unforgettable." His other works include "Mama from the Train," "Allentown Jail," and "Two Brothers."

La Vie en rose

Louiguy (music), a pen name for Louis Guglielmi, was a Spanish-born French musician of Italian descent. He studied music at the Conservatoire de Paris and created almost three dozen scores for films such as *City of Hope*, *Toâ*, and *Verdict*.

Édith Piaf (lyrics) was a French entertainer best known for performing songs in the cabaret and modern chanson genres. She is widely regarded as France's greatest popular singer and one of the most celebrated performers of the 20th century.

Mack David (English lyrics) was an American lyricist and songwriter, best known for his work in film and television, and credited with writing lyrics or music or both for over one thousand songs. He was particularly well known for his work on the Disney films *Cinderella* and *Alice in Wonderland*.

What a Diff'rence a Day Made (Cuando vuelva a tu lado)

Maria Grever (music and lyrics) was the first Mexican woman composer to achieve international acclaim. She studied music in France, with Claude Debussy and Franz Lenhard among her teachers, and wrote more than 1000 songs. She once said: "I had to leave my country, and now in New York, I am interested in Jazz and Modern Rhythms, but above all, in Mexican Music...there is such a cultural richness in Mexican Music where melody and rhythm merge."

Stanley Adams (English lyrics) was an American lyricist and songwriter. He wrote the English lyrics for "What a Diff'rence a Day Made" (sometimes sung as "What a Diff'rence a Day Makes") and for "La Cucaracha." Adams was the president of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) between 1953-1956 and again from 1959 until 1980.

A Fine Romance

Jerome Kern (music) is considered one of the most important composers of musical theatre and popular music of the early twentieth century, having written more than 700 songs including "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes," "Long Ago (and Far Away)," and "The Song is You" among others.

Dorothy Fields (lyrics) is a lyricist and librettist who was among Tin Pan Alley and Hollywood's most successful female songwriters. Her songs include "I'm in the Mood for Love," "On the Sunny Side of the Street," and "Big Spender."

Tennessee Waltz

Pee Wee King (music) was a songwriter who served on the board of the Country Music Hall of Fame and is credited with bringing the musicians union to the Grand Ole Opry. He wrote or co-wrote more than 400 songs and became one of the charter members of the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame.

Redd Stewart (lyrics) was a songwriter who collaborated with Pee Wee King to write many top 10 country music hits including "When Love Dies Where Does it Go," "You Belong to Me" and "Tennessee Waltz," which was proclaimed by Governor Frank Clement in 1965 as the Tennessee state song.

Blame it on my Youth

Oscar Levant (music) was an American concert pianist, composer, conductor, author, radio game show panelist, television talk show host, comedian, and actor. A play about his life, *Good Night, Oscar*, appeared on Broadway in 2023.

Edward Heyman (lyrics) was a lyricist and producer, best known for his lyrics to "Body and Soul", "When I Fall in Love", and "For Sentimental Reasons". In 1975, he was inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame in 1975.

Don't Smoke in Bed

Willard Robison (music and lyrics) was an American vocalist, pianist, and composer of popular songs, including "A Cottage for Sale", "Round My Old Deserted Farm", "Don't Smoke in Bed", "'Taint So, Honey, 'Taint So" and "Old Folks". In 1926-27, he recorded a series of eight jazz songs under the name "American Suite."

Ev'ry Time We Say Goodbye

Cole Porter (music and lyrics) was an American composer and songwriter. His songs were noted for their witty, urbane lyrics, and many of his scores found success on Broadway and in Hollywood films, including "Night and Day,""I Get a Kick Out of You," and "In the Still of the Night."

We'll Meet Again

Ross Parker (music and lyrics) was considered one of England's top songwriters in 1938, with his pieces hitting top 15 on the Billboard charts. Some of his hits include "There'll Always Be an England," "The Girl In The Blue Bonnet," and "I Won't Tell A Soul (I Love You)."

Hughie Charles (music and lyrics), a musical theatre producer and composer, is perhaps best known for his work with Ross Parker on "We'll Meet Again," and "There'll Always Be an England." His other works includes "Russian Rose," "A Little King Without A Crown," and "The King Is Still In London."

Dream a Little Dream of Me

Fabian Andre (music) was a composer and orchestra leader. He released an album of rumbas and had a hit with the song "Dance of an Ear of Corn." News of his death in 1960 prompted Michelle Phillips, who met Andre as a child, to re-record "Dream a Little Dream of Me" with her band, The Mamas and the Papas.

Wilbur Schwandt (music) was an arranger for various big bands, including comedian Bob Hope's touring show. In 1940, he became an arranger for Xavier Cugat's orchestra; he later became an arranger and composer for Latin lounge musicians such as Skinnay Ennis and Freddy Martin as well as Latin dance musicians such as Perez Prado and Desi Arnaz.

Gus Kahn (lyrics) contributed a number of songs to the Great American Songbook, including "Ain't We Got Fun?", "Toot, Toot, Tootsie (Goo' Bye!)", "It Had to Be You", "Yes Sir, That's My Baby", and "Makin' Whoopee". His papers are housed at the Great American Songbook Foundation.

Jacob Viramontes (Lighting Designer) graduated from PLU in 2017 with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in acting and directing. DIRECTORS' NOTES

Beginning in the early 1900s, an exceptionally talented group of songwriters working mainly from the recording studios of New York's Tin Pan Alley began churning out hundreds of songs. This happened in Manhattan's flower district, where overlapping blues, jazz, ragtime, ballad, anthem, and uptempo dance numbers spilled out onto the street, creating a sound that some said sounded like tin pans being beaten together.

These tunes were often sold as sheet music so that families could play them at home on a piano. Together, they formed the great American Songbook, which isn't a physical book, but more of an idea: an enduring collection of popular jazz standards and show tunes from the 1920s to the early 1960s.

This explosion of music happened at a time when millions of Americans had been plunged into poverty as a result of World War One and the Great Depression, and these songs changed the face of American music. Many were written by women, composers of color, queer composers, and Jewish composers escaping persecution in Europe–all of whom are heavily represented in tonight's performance. The great American Songbook celebrates the voices and stories of America itself.

These are storytelling songs first and foremost: each singer sharing stories of longing for love, finding love, losing love, dancing the night away, or striving for a better, easier life than the one they are currently living.
